Brian Buckelew Winner of First Gorilla Golf

Brian Buckelew became the first winner of the first ACE Gorilla Golf Tournament, held on October 10, 2011, at Brookfield Country Club in Roswell, Georgia.

Many thanks go to the golfers, their supporters and our sponsors for making this event a great success. Andy Pachman was the golfer who raised the most donations, totaling over \$3,000. The tournament raised over \$10,000, which will be distributed to two projects of the Dian Fossey Gorilla Fund International (DFGFI). The two projects are the Tayna-Maiko-Kahuzi-Biega landscape in Congo and the Gorilla Rehabilitation and **Conservation Education** (GRACE) Center. Both projects are working towards protecting the ecosystem where the endangered Grauer's gorilla lives as well as many other animal species, providing a safe corridor for animals to travel between two national parks, and supporting the first permanent sanctuary ever built for gorilla rescue and rehabilitaion of the Grauer's gorilla.



The weather did not treat our golfers well by being cold and rainy, but when the event was over, none of the golfers were complaining. They all spoke fondly of the good time they had and how they were proud to support ACE.

Support Conservation. Promote Nation's First Wildlife Stamp




On September 20, 2011, the U.S. Postal Service began issuing a Save Vanishing Species Semipostal Stamp (priced at 55 cents), in the tiger design in a pane of 20 stamps. With the issuance of the *Save* Vanishing Species semipostal stamp, the **U.S.** Postal Service supports conservation funds that are helping to create hope for the future for African and Asian elephants, rhinos, tigers, and all species of great apes and sea turtles. This is only the fourth stamp of this kind and will be remain on sale for at least two years.

President Obama signed the Multinational Species Conservation Funds (MSCF) Semipostal Stamp Act into law in 2010, providing an opportunity for the public to support U.S. Fish & Wildlife Services' (USFWS) mission to save imperiled species globally, targeting endangered species worldwide that are of great importance to the American public.

The U.S. Postal Service will transfer the net proceeds from the sale of this stamp to the USFWS to support the Multinational Species Conservation Funds. For every stamp sold, 11 cents will go directly to this program. (Concept is similar to the breast cancer research postal stamp which has generated \$70 million in the past decade.)

As of 2011, these funds include the African Elephant Conservation Fund, the Asian Elephant Conservation Fund, the Great Ape Conservation Fund, the Rhinoceros and Tiger Conservation Fund, and the Marine Turtle Conservation Fund.



While MSCF is currently funded by Congress, the current fiscal climate in Washington indicates that cuts will be made across the board, including conservation programs like the MSCF. The wildlife stamp has the potential to close the gap or even increase the program's overall funding, at no expense to American taxpayers.

This program benefits over 250 grant recipients in over 75 countries worldwide. Seventeen percent of AZA member institutions receive these federal grant dollars.


