



Book Reviews



The Impenetrable Forest
My Gorilla Years in
Uganda by Thor Hanson

Before I began reading this book about the experiences of a Peace Corps volunteer, it was given a seal of approval by Bede Campbell, also a Peace Corps volunteer in Uganda and an ACE member. Bede had already read it and she gave it a "thumbs up" for a realistic portrayal of the two years spent in a remote Ugandan village as a *muzungu*.

Thor takes us along with him as he journeys from a

stranger to all to a friend to many in the community he lives in, on the edge of the Bwindi Impenetrable Forest. While he is learning and respecting the traditions, he finds the people there surviving in very difficult circumstances. He shares his experiences with the varied local moonshine and his attempts to grow a vegetable garden only to have the baboons claim his produce. The attack of the army arts in the middle of the night and throughout every room of his little house was both a close call for him and a story relayed with humor. Comparatively and heartbreakingly, without naming the disease, Thor feels the despair of losing a number of his closest friends to AIDS and absorbing the reality that the scourge is far from over. His friends, having witnessed it over and over again, seem to accept the finality of the disease with a grace he cannot quite understand.

Thor's particular Peace Corps task was to work with the local trackers, train more, and devise a system for tourists to visit the mountain gorilla families and, thus, create an impetus to save them. They cleared trails, worked on security for the gorillas, and they made the initial humangorilla contacts. I have this book at home and am glad to share it with anyone who would like to read it.



Of Bonobos and Men: A Journey to the Heart of the Congo by Deni Ellis Bechard

Bonobos have captured the public imagination in recent years, due not least to their famously active sex lives. Less well known is the fact that these great apes don't kill their own kind, and that they share nearly 99% of our DNA. Their approach to building peaceful coalitions and sharing resources has much to teach us, particularly at a time when our violent ways have pushed them to the brink of extinction.

Of Bonobos and Men is the account of acclaimed author Deni Ellis Bechard's journey into the Congo to understand bonobos and to learn how to save them. Along the way, common purpose and respect for indigenous knowledge, have resulted in the protection of vast swaths of the rainforest. And we discover how small solutions - found through

most effective in tackling our biggest challenges. Combining elements of travelogue, journalism, and natural history, this incomparable rich book takes the reader not only deep into the Congo, but also into our past and future, revealing new ways to save the environment and ourselves.

This is a great read. I heard the author and Bonobo Conservation Initiative Sally Jewell Coxe at the Decatur Library a couple of years ago. Fascinating discussion of BCI's efforts to save the bonobos.

Did you know?

The U.S. House of Representatives approved an amendment to lift the ban that requires U.S companies to disclose their use of Congolese conflict minerals in the manufacturing of electronics. This may be tearing out a significant block in the protection of Grauer's gorillas. Will this species of gorilla die out with the creation of a new, legal market for coltan in the Democratic Republic of Congo?

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ACE participated in the First World Gorilla Day on September 24, 2017 at Zoo Atlanta. Zoo guests heard lots of information about great apes and the mission of ACE. Coloring pictures of gorillas and other apes was a fun activity for the kids.

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Since our founding in 2006, Ape Conservation Effort has donated over \$206,000 to non-profits working to save great apes in the wild.

"Becoming Jane" is an article in the October 2017 National Geographic. The article is about Jane Goodall, a novice scientist who became famous because of her groundbreaking studies of chimpanzees. Newly revealed images shed light on how she did it, the compromises she made, and the photographer she loved.




