Jodi Carrigan's article in DFGFI newsletter

In the spring 2012 issue of *The Dian Fossey Gorilla Journal*, the DFGFI newsletter, Jodi Carrigan wrote an article entitled: "Gorillas in the wild: the visitor experience".

In this article Jodi tells about her experiences of visiting Rwanda and the gorillas. She gives the procedures and rules to see the gorillas and shares the unbelievable experience of meeting the gorillas.

"I'll never forget my first trek. As we were hiking up the mountain and just before we arrived at the group's location, we heard a chest beat that echoed throughout the mountain; it brought tears of joy and excitement. This was the moment I never thought would happen." Jodi's experience is informative and interesting. Blind Sumatran orangutan mother able to see her baby twins for the first time after ground breaking cataract surgery

An August 30, 2012 press release from the Sumatran Orangutan Conservation Programme (SOCP) introduces us to an elderly blind female orangutan named Gober.

She is unique not only because she is blind in both eyes, but she is also the mother of two 18 month-old twin infants, Ganteng (male) and Ginting (female). Interestingly the father of the twins is also blind, as a result of being shot 62 times by an air rifle several years ago, with 2 pellets lodged in one eve and one in the other eye.

"Twin orangutan births are not unheard of," explained Dr. Ian Singleton, Conservation Director of the Swiss based PanEco Foundation and head of the SOCP, "I have heard of some 10 - 15 cases in my career, but twins whose parents are both blind is totally unique."

Gober was captured in late 2008 for her own safety, because she would have been killed by farmers when she raided their crops to survive. She was taken to the orangutan quarantine centre near Medan, in North Sumatra, Indonesia. There she was introduced to a blind male orangutan, Leuser, and they produced the twins. Gober has been an exemplary mother. When the twins became old enough to separate from mom for the operation, she had the surgery.

"We found no evidence of any damage to the retina of either eye and so I am very hopeful that Gober will regain a large amount of her sight, meaning that all being well, there's every chance she will finally be able to see her twin infants for the first time very soon," commented Dr. R. Arie Umboh, a human eye specialist from Samarinda.

Cataract surgery for orangutans is still very rare and this is probably the first such operation in Indonesia.
