

Exciting Announcement from PASA

I'm writing today with some very special news to share. PASA is delighted to announcement a new partnership with the **QATO Foundation to** establish an island sanctuary for chimpanzees in the Congo Basin! The island sanctuary, located in northern Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), will be managed by PASA member J.A.C.K. Sanctuary and will provide safety for up to 120 chimpanzees rescued from the illegal wildlife trade.

PASA's member chimpanzee sanctuaries in the DRC are experts in rehabilitating rescued chimpanzees, but their existing sanctuaries have reached maximum capacity. The new sanctuary will be created in Boyoma Island, a large 66-hectare island covered by natural forest. The island sanctuary will allow rescued chimpanzees to live in dynamic family groups and develop important skills necessary for living in the wild, as well as provide urgent medical and rehabilitative care to new arrivals.

This is a monumental step towards protecting chimpanzees in the DRC. With a new sanctuary in place, we can further our efforts to combat wildlife

trafficking. The new sanctuary is an important part of a comprehensive program being initiated by PASA and our DRC members to combat the trafficking of primates and systematically tackle the roots of the illegal trade.

The QATO Foundation is a Danish non-profit and charitable organization that supports small and large projects that work to improve animal welfare.

Study: apes may remember old friends, family

Humanity's complex social networks may be deep evolutionary roots.

The results, publishes in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, amount to some of the longest-lasting memories ever recorded in the animal kingdom. The discovery suggests that humanity's complex social networks have deep evolutionary roots, with long-term memory probably being a trait possessed by the common ancestor of humans, chimps and bonobos several million years ago.

To peer into the apes' minds, researchers enticed 26 chimps and bonobos at zoos in Scotland and Belgium and at an ape sanctuary in Japan to saddle up to a monitor. Using a straw with fruit juice to keep their heads still and an infrared camera to track their eye movement, the team showed that animals a pair of side-to-side images for three seconds. The apes were not restrained during the experiment.

One image was of an ape they previously had lived with. The other was a complete stranger.

On average, the bonobos and chimps that saw both images looked at their old groupmates for about a quarter of a second longer than the stranger.

Christopher Krupenye, an assistant professor at Johns Hopkins University who co-wrote the study, likened the apes reaction to walking past an old high school classmate on the street.

"You might do a doubletake," he said. "In some sense, our study is like that."



Michael Platt, a University of Pennsylvania Professor who also has done eyetracking research, stopped short of saying the experiment showed that bonobos and chimps truly recognized their old buddies. Instead, he said the results suggest the animals may have had a feeling of familiarity with images of old groupmates.

When it come to longterm memory, chimps and bonobos join the ranks of humans and dolphins. Previous research has found dolphins can remember each other's whistles for more than two decades.

Bonobos and chimps looked longer at old groupmates with whom they had groomed and had positive relationships in the past - longer, that is , at friends than foes, though whether the animals are capable of friendship has been up for debate.

For Krupenye, the results confirm what he and others working for years with apes have experienced anecdotally.

"You have this distinct impression when we return that they very clearly seem to recognize you," he said.
