PASA Update

PASA is holding two workshops for member centers this year. Our Sanctuary Workshop will bring the leaders of our 23 member centers together under the theme, "Protecting Wild Primates." Our **Community Education** Workshop will bring together educators and community outreach personnel from our member centers to exchange experiences and knowledge, review latest best practices and ethical standards on community conservation, and conservation landscapes. These workshops are hugely beneficial to our members' work, ensuring that combined specialist knowledge or decades of protecting primates is shared across the Alliance.

I recently shared exciting news about the creation of the Boyoma Island

chimpanzee sanctuary in Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). DRC is a country of incredible biodiversity - especially with regards to primates but overexploitation, extreme poverty, and the illegal wildlife trade are having devastating effects on its wildlife. In 2022 we created the Great Ape Taskforce to combine our members' efforts to protect primates in DRC. I'm happy to say that we have recently begun work on two additional projects in the DRC to protect the future of the imperiled apes. With generous funding from the Arcus Foundation, we are working to understand drivers of urban primate consumption in a major city and identify ways to reduce demand. With support from the Darwin Initiative, we are also working with the DRC government to strengthen their response to the illegal wildlife trade and build capacity to tackle this terrible threat to endangered apes and monkeys in key areas across the country. I look forward to sharing updates from these projects over the next few years.

Finally, in West Africa, our Action for Chimpanzees project, supported by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Narcotics and International Affairs, has been making great strides in reaching the public with key conservation

messaging. As part of this project, our member Tacugama Chimpanzee Sanctuary has been broadcasting a series of radio jingles on stations throughout Sierra Leone to raise awareness about conserving chimpanzees. The project supports antipoaching and biomonitoring patrols in vital chimpanzee habitat. Along with providing crucial data on chimpanzee populations and their threats, camera traps have captured some amazing images of the chimpanzees and other wildlife that we are working hard to protect.

Incredible Orangutan News from Orangutan **Outreach**

Wild orangutan uses herbal medicine to successfully treat his wound.

This story has been going viral for the past few days...and we (Orangutan Outreach) want to make sure all our friends and supporters see it! We all know how special orangutans are, but the story of Rakus has been spreading beyond the choir, so to speak. We hope that more people will be amazed by Rakus and want to help us protect his cousins in Sumatra and Borneo.

When a wild orangutan in Indonesia suffered a painful wound to his cheek, he did something that stunned researchers: He chewed plant leaves known to have painrelieving and healing properties, rubbed the juice on the open wound and then used the leaves as a poultice to cover his injury.

A fully-flanged adult male Sumatran orangutan cheekpadder names Rakus chewed up yellow root and applied it to an open facial wound, closing the sore within days.

"This case represents the first known case of active wound treatment in a wild animal with a medical plant," biologist Isabelle Laumer, the first author of a paper about the revelation, told NPR.

She says she was "very excited" about the orangutan's seeming innovation, which was documented at the Suaq Balimbing research site in the Gunung Leuser National Park in northwest Sumatra, where some 150 orangutans live in a protected rainforest.

The orangutan is named Rakus. Laumer says he might have picked up the large wound in a fight with a rival male. A few days later, he was seen using a plant to treat his injury. The wound then healed, seemingly without any infection.
